The FHSECO is organized as a public benefit corporation exclusively for charitable & educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501 (C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, more specifically, to discover, collect, restore, and preserve materials of information, publications, accounts, and illustrations about Southeast Colorado, and then, develop, promote, and teach said history to engage the community. A repository for historic data. We serve all of Southeast Colorado with our volunteer program and historic projects. So come join us!

Our Annual Meeting will be Saturday February 3, 2024 at 2 pm at 101 N Grand in Manzanola at the old Armory. We are also looking for members to join our team that love history, would love to see the schoolhouse restored and Southeast Colorado history preserved.

The "Little" White Schoolhouse was built in 1877, flat roofed and covered in dirt, 12 years after the Civil War and 23 years before the RF Sugar Factory. It was truly part of the Wild West. It was first to accommodate 15-20 students. In 1883 the little adobe school house was weather boarded on the outside, a shingle roof put on and the building was painted white. It was the first schoolhouse in the township of Rocky Ford, and was originally located where Nava Manor Is located now on 10th Street. Ten years later, Rocky Ford held its first election in the building on August 6, 1887. The Schoolhouse was the place of all important meetings at the time, whether it was held as a voting booth, a city ordinance meeting, or a meeting place for churches, etc. While the Sugar Factory was being built, the town grew very fast and the student population doubled and tripled in size monthly. In 1896 the school was then enlarged and added another room to hold more students. Finally, when a bigger school was built to replace this building (known as the First Liberty School) this school was then sold, dismantled in order to remove the adobe and moved to its present location in 1897, then rebuilt.

The Friends plan on restoring the 1877, historic Little White Schoolhouse to its original condition but cannot start until we can get funding. Our share of a Colorado Historical Society grant would be about 25%. We can start sooner If we could get more volunteers and of course, money! We are a 501(c)(3) so you could receive a tax deduction if you chose to donate. If you need a tax deduction by the end of the year, please contact us.

Membership Drive for the FHSECO Is in our initial phase in developing this organization, last year we offered everyone who paid a \$25 membership that you would be in a drawing to win one of four guns or \$200 cash. We drew for the prizes on December 1, 2022 and we would like to congratulate M Mariani, J Bland, H Carter & R Van Dyke, who won the guns and J Beal who won the cash. J Beal graciously donated the \$200 back to the Friends. Thank you all so much for joining the Friends of Historic Southeast Colorado. The Friends have 212 members as of November 2023. From the membership drive we raised \$5,300 in annual memberships and \$4548 in donations. Our goal for the Friends would be to have at least 500 annual memberships in support of our mission.

As an incentive for this year, the Friends are donating another **\$200 cash** in a drawing using each paid membership for the coming year and each year thereafter. So, don't delay in getting your donations in. We will draw on February 3, 2024 at our annual meeting.





Our volunteers will be working from home until our new office in the schoolhouse has some restoration before working in there. Our plan for the future is to also have classes in the schoolhouse like quilting, painting, computer classes, genealogy, a historic mock school setting, etc. We plan on helping Southeast Colorado in raising funds for specific historic community projects like restoring the schoolhouse, Rocky Ford ghost signs, geomodeling the Historic Engleville cemetery near Trinidad, which the town mine was started in 1876, public projects, etc.

Items Needed!!!!! Those old historic newspapers, scrap books, flyers, signs, documents, newspaper clippings, family trees, pictures of Southeast Colorado, awards, phone books, historic data, maps etc. When you are digging through your parents, and/or grandparents' items, thinking "what am I going to do with all of it?". Now you have a place to take it. The Friends are also interested in any historical Southeast Colorado book for our library. We are also looking for historic playground equipment for the yard. Email or call us!

The Schoolhouse was gutted of chalkboards and child desks, etc. in the late 1800s to use in other schools in Rocky Ford, so we are looking to replace them. Items needed are four rows of school desks seating 20 students. There was also a framed picture of Washington and Lincoln in the school room as well as individual slates. Also, if you have a late 1800's old pot belly stove you are not using, we would be interested in it. Let us know what you have. Our goal is to recreate a late 1800's schoolhouse to show our current students how it was back then.

Walking Tours of Downtown Rocky Ford: Emmett Davis, a Friend of FHSECO will be offering walking tours in Rocky Ford. Then we plan to give tours in other areas soon. If you would like to help in these tours of local towns, please contact us. Comfortable shoes are a must! Tours will be wandering south and east through Rocky Ford's historic neighborhoods, through Main Street to library park, and to the Fairgrounds to see the historic adobe stables.

Donation Items received, On loan, is a Swink family bible and two Swink family quilts. Donations to the Friends for the repository is a box of class of 1956 memorabilia, a large stack of RFHS Le Cantaloupe annuals, local books, a large framed unknown uncompleted family tree found in a basement in Manzanola, two sets of antique reading glasses in the cases marked from historic Rocky Ford businesses, two masonic aprons dated 1899 and 1916 that belonged to the Covers which will be donated to the Masons in Rocky Ford.

Fowler Historical Society, has donated to the Friends an 1884 cabin that was originally located North of the Arkansas River on the west side of the road. Years later it was moved to Las Animas and then landed up at the Historical Society. It needs moved due to the property North of the Museum being sold. It now belongs to the Friends and we will move it to 407 North 12th behind the White schoolhouse in Rocky Ford. Those interested in helping with the move, please let us know. It will be taken down and marked piece by piece and put back up the same way.



Grants, We need a working furnace, an A/C and our own water and sewer tap at the schoolhouse. The schoolhouse had water and sewer but was connected to the building to the South. The friends are actively working on getting that project going after recently obtaining a grant from the Robert Hoag Rawlings Foundation. In the meantime, we cannot be opened for any research or cataloging of items due to extreme hot or cold weather at this time until the building gets opened to the public. Ed and Gloria had purchased the El Capitan in 1988, which was built in 1901. Gloria had worked there many years before purchasing the restaurant from the Reed family. Ed helped at the restaurant and he had greeted and seated everyone who came in with a huge smile, he is missed dearly. Gloria went on and ran the family business. After purchasing the restaurant, Gloria added her special touch by adding in homemade bread served with the meal, then a little later adding the famous Cantaloupe Preserves which everyone loved and now miss. Gloria retired in 2017 and the El Capitan was sold. The restaurant and the preserves have been missed since... until now.



2024 Lifetime Achievement Award: Next year's Lifetime achievement award will be awarded to a person who will be chosen by the Directors after receiving a letter of the history of that individual/s story including pictures to complete the story. All lifetime stories need to be sent by June 1st, 2024 to the Friends. Our annual Arkansas Valley Parade entry will highlight our chosen Lifetime achievement individual.

The Friends raised just over \$600 from the sales of Cantaloupe Preserves in 2022 with the cantaloupes being provided by Hirakata Farms. The Friends are selling preserves again this year with a new label using a picture provided by the FNB of Colorado and the cantaloupes provided by Knapp Farms. Again, all of the supplies for the preserves were provided by Floyd and Jeanette Myers. Over 130 jars were sold this year, they went quick!

Fox Family Foundation, A grant was applied with The Jonathan & Shari Fox Foundation and the FHSECO was granted \$500 in December 2022 towards repairs on the schoolhouse. A Big thank you is in order for the Jonathan & Shari Fox Family Foundation.

GoFundMe, A GoFundMe account has been set up in the name of FHSECO so we can move forward in restoring our Little White Schoolhouse. A link is also on our website for ease of donating.

Online Yard Sale, The Friends will be selling items on Craigslist and Facebook soon for continued restoration of the schoolhouse. Those items donated and some by the Kitch family are two high quality Southwest paintings, other paintings, drawings, a nice box set of quality real silverware with the serving pieces, a historic Mack saddle in excellent condition, a high quality 9' Christmas Tree, etc. Please Call Jeanette (719-468-9126) for more info. The Friends also purchased random items, cleaned them up and resold them on Facebook and raised another \$600 last year.

Computers, printers, etc. The Friends have purchased one state of the art laptop for the Friends in late December of 2022 and are in need of a couple more updated computers and a color laser printer in order to start our research lab. Our goal is to create a library so any person can research Southeastern Colorado and/or their family tree. Also we could use these computers to teach others computer technology and do research. You can also learn and create your own family tree charts of any type as well.

Demolition of the First National Bank in RF: The Friends talked to the FNBC staff and was given a tour of the Bank building and said that they plan on razing the building after the new bank is built in the first week of April 2023. The new building has been built where the old building was razed in 2022 of the old Carousel, before that it was Hested's and it was our first Safeway location. The bank's decision was made to raze the building due to high costs of restoration of the old building. We asked if the bank would donate the two sets of historic pictures placed on glass on the south side of the building facing Elm street and the long set of historic pictures placed on glass inside the bank. The Bank staff said that they would be interested in saving the windows. The Friends found an owner for the large 7 foot windows but unfortunately, couldn't get them out in time. They went down with the building. The 20-foot-long set of pictures of the Yagami's historic farm market, which was located about 1 mile South of Mary's Fruit Stand West of Swink, went to Chuck Hanagan to be displayed at the Old Sugar Factory in Swink. A huge thanks to Dustin Bryan for getting them down after about 5 hours of dedicated work. Thank you to Henry Dierks for saving the Beman slab of concrete from the bank building after it was torn down. The building was once Beman Motors years ago prior to the bank owning it, which will soon be placed in the schoolyard.
